## ROTARY - A LOOK AT THE FUTURE VISION PILOT'S FIRST YEAR

Rotary International News, 22 September - One hundred Rotary districts and their member clubs set a brisk pace in the first year of the Future Vision pilot,

recording many milestones along the way. The Rotary Foundation awarded 208 global grants, totaling almost US\$12 million, in 2010-11. These grants supported large-scale, sustainable activities aligned with Rotary's areas of focus in 46 countries.

The first global grant project, completed in July, proved highly effective in preventing the spread of dengue fever in a community in Surakarta, Central Java, Indonesia. Other global grant efforts helped provide thousands of people in Sierra Leone with access to clean water, boosted malaria prevention and treatment in Mali, improved sanitation in India, and expanded literacy in Kenya, to name a few. The grants also funded vocational training teams and equipped scholars to work in sustainable development, health care, peace and conflict resolution, and other fields related to the areas of focus.

More than \$6 million in Rotary Foundation District Grants supported local and international service projects. District 2650 (Japan) distributed funds from a \$271,000 grant to 42 club projects, which included providing

computers, sewing machines, and other vocational training equipment to a village in the Philippines, and restoring an elementary school in China's Shaanxi Province.

The Foundation also formed strategic partnerships with Aga Khan University, a private, nonsectarian university with campuses worldwide, and Oikocredit International, a Netherlands-based cooperative financial institution. Through the partnership with Aga Khan University, Rotary clubs can establish vocational training teams and nursing scholarships with support from packaged global grants. Through the partnership with Oikocredit, clubs can work with microfinance institutions in Oikocredit's network, also with support from packaged global grants, and help reduce poverty by identifying local needs, developing effective approaches, and structuring training programs to improve entrepreneurs' business skills.

Pilot clubs and districts are helping to verify what works in the Foundation's new grant model under the Future Vision Plan. Based on feedback from Rotarians, the Foundation is also making operational improvements during the pilot.

MACOMB — Nye Fulton Bouslog, 91, of Macomb passed away peacefully on Thursday, Sept. 29, 2011, at St. Francis Hospital in Peoria. His death followed a short illness.

Nye belonged to the Macomb Rotary Club for more than 64 years. He earned the Lifetime Outstanding and Dedicated Service Award in 1995. He served as district governor in 1980-1981.

He was also past president and a Paul Harris Fellow. Nye served on the board of directors for Union National Bank and the State Bank of Industry. He was a member of the Macomb Elks Lodge, American Legion Post 6, Macomb Country Club, Lamoine Valley Board of Realtors and the W.I.U. Foundation. He was a contributing writer for the Prairie Farmer magazine for 25 years. He also served 12 years on the board of education for the Macomb Public Schools.

## RI APPROVES MATCHING GRANT FOR ASOKORO AND MACOMB ROTARY CLUBS

The Rotary Foundation has approved a Matching Grant submitted by the Asokoro Rotary Club, District 9125, and the Rotary club of Macomb, District 6460. This MG will be administered by the Asokoro Club and President Kanayo Chukwumezie, and consists of a water well and a toilet facility for the Kpaduma Village near Abuja, Nigeria. In addition the Asokoro and Macomb Rotary clubs will give \$500 each for books and school supplies to the neighboring Kobi-Madakai Village, making this MG one that provides all three of the areas of Major Emphasis for RIPP D. K.

Lee: Water, Health and Hunger, and Literacy. The additional money for the books and school supplies was not included in

the original MG application because the additional money would have caused the grant to exceed \$25,000, increasing the requirements for submission of the grant application.

The water well will enable the girls of the Kpaduma to attend school, because at this time the girls of the village spend all day every day carrying water to the village from the nearest water source. The toilet facility will save many lives of the children who would be infected by the deadly E. Coli bacteria which infect the village due to poor sanitation. Four of five children in Africa never reach the age of five due to childhood disease and malnutrition. The children of the Kpaduma Village will no longer be threatened by the E. Coli bacterium.

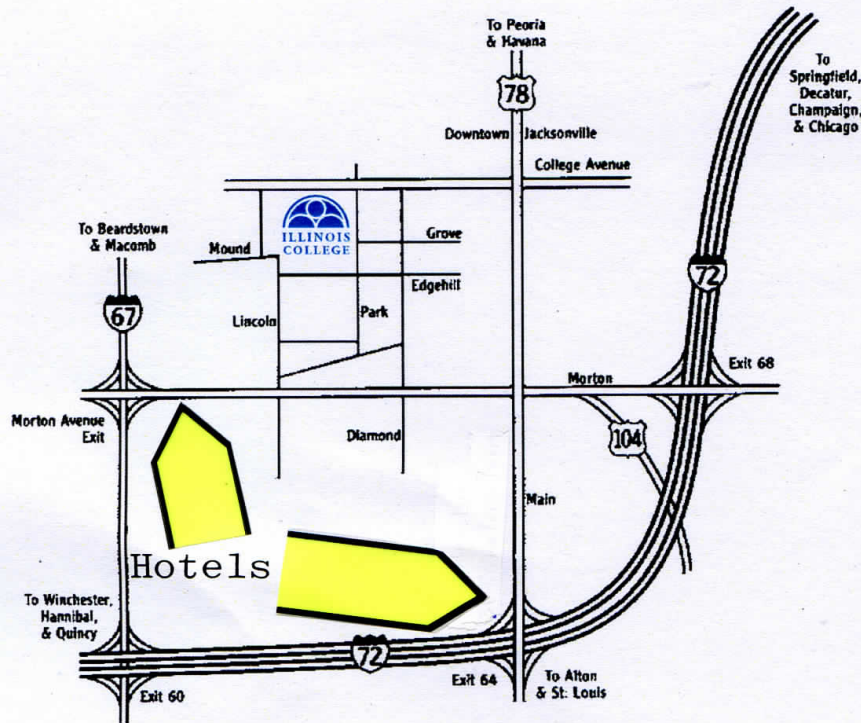
